## **CURRENT CATALOG DESCRIPTION:**

This course covers a broad number of issues in the economics of sports. Issues studied relate to monopoly structure of professional sports, labor relations between owners and players, and public subsidies to professional sports franchises. Should time allow, the class also will discuss the economics of intercollegiate sports.

This course covers issues in the economics and finance of sports. Issues studied relate to monopoly structure of professional sports, labor relations between owners and players and between colleges and collegiate athletes, public subsidies to professional sports franchises, and the economics of intercollegiate sports. In addition, the course covers topics in the governance and financing of sports organizations.

## **RATIONALE FOR CHANGE:**

At present the course is not available for credit toward the economics major. Large numbers of students have expressed interest in taking the course but been deterred by the lack of credit toward the major. The addition of the statistics requirement is in recognition of the fact that most of the material focuses on statistical assessment of

relationships which is difficult for students without the stats background to fully understand. Another course with the 101 and STAT prereqs has a 3xx label (320).
