

UMBC UGC Program Changes & Other Request: Major: Management of Aging Services (Erickson School)

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Proposed Effective Date: Fall 16

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Specifics (see instructions):

The Erickson School requests that the following changes be made to the Major in the Management of Aging Services.

Reduce major requirements to a total of 39 credits.

Rationale (see instructions):

The new core course changes and the combining of several of our core courses represents the final revision to the undergraduate major. After several meetings of the Curriculum committee, faculty agreed that there was substantial overlap within the core course requirements. It was also noted that much like other program on campus that offer an Internship opportunity, the credit hours needed to be reduced and an option to extend the internship was offered as an elective to the students. This revision was recommended by the Erickson School Curriculum Committee in response to feedback from students, internship supervisors, the industry sources and faculty. They are in line with the suggested actions specified in the Erickson School Middle States Evaluation protocol. The revised major as proposed will better prepare students to demonstrate the essential competencies required for entry into the field as articulated in the Erickson School program goals, and Internship and Capstone requirements that are mandatory for graduation. This completes the process of eliminating the additional credits added by prerequisites for courses in other departments.

The current major is as follows:

Students must complete 51 credits, including a 42-credit interdisciplinary core and 9 elective credits in two areas.
