PROPOSED CATALOG DESCRIPTION (Approximately 75 words in length. Please use full sentences.):

This interdisciplinary course explores cultural, political, and social dimensions of the U.S.-Philippine War and the cultures of United States imperialism from approximately 1896 to 1904. The course will address several themes, including empire, gender, racialized violence, sovereignty, critiques of the media, and the use of expressive forms of culture.

RATIONALE FOR NEW COURSE:

This course was previously taught during a trial run in the Spring 2012 semester. The AMST department would like to add this course on a regular rotation to AMST students who are looking to deepen their understanding of United States cultural studies. The AMST department recently received approval for its Minor in Asian American Studies. The proposed AMST 469 course will complement existing courses in that program—specifically, AMST 369 Filipino American Cultural Studies, which is an introductory course)—and will provide students with an opportunity to engage in senior-level research and writing. The course will be taught every other year.
