RATIONALE FOR CHANGE:

We are removing the prerequisite requirement of AMST 300 for all Department of American Studies 400-level seminars. Requiring AMST 300 (a methods course primarily for AMST majors) limits access to students from other departments or programs adding AMST 400-level seminars, like AMST 480, without instructor permission. As practice, requests to add our 400-level seminars are granted to interested students and we want to limit barriers for students interested in registering for these seminars, some of which count towards credit for degrees in other departments or programs such as Africana Studies, the Entrepreneurship minor, or the undergraduate public history track.

In addition, the title for AMST 480 has been edited from "Community in America" to the more specific "Community in America Research Seminar" to clearly reflect in the title (as well as course description) that this is a research seminar where students will complete and present original research. This more clearly differentiates the AMST 480 course from the Department's AMST 380: Community in America readings/survey course in the catalog.
