Rationale (see instructions):This requested change is occasioned by the fact that the department has a reduced number of Africa faculty [i.e., one] which limits our flexibility in being able to offer a particular Africa course on a regular basis. By expanding the requirement to three courses, this will allow for greater flexibility in our Africa offerings. And, just as importantly, it will allow our major and minor students greater flexibility in meeting their lower level Africa requirement.

It should be noted that the three courses in question: AFST 211, 212, and 213, though unique in some aspects of their coverage of Africa, also contain a fair amount of overlap in terms of information about African history and culture.

Current students will not be affected adversely by the requested change. Indeed, they will have increased options in meeting the lower level Africa requirement.

There is no change in the required credits for either the major or the minor.
