CURRENT CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

The history of the Aegean—Crete, Greece and the Cyclades—in the Neolithic and Bronze Age is studied through archaeological remains. Special emphasis is placed on the Minoan and Mycenaean civilizations.

Exploration of reasons for the emergence and devolution of complex societies in the prehistoric Aegean (Greece, East Turkey, Crete) from the arrival of the first farmers ca. 7000 BCE until the end Bronze Age, ca. 1100 BCE. The course covers Cycladic, Minoan, and Mycenaean civilizations and focuses on distinguishing local and regional causes of change, such as demography and climate, from interregional sources of change, such as trade and diplomacy. Relevant archaeological methods are discussed.

RATIONALE FOR CHANGE:

To bring the course number into conformity with the new ANCS rationalized system (where x10 = Aegean/Greece region), and to bring the course description into conformity with the manner in which it has been taught and the material covered since SP09. Direct assessment of learning includes embedded test questions introducing a body of evidence of a type that the student has been taught but which has not been previously directly introduced.
