CURRENT CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

This course introduces students to the history of conventional usage in written form. Standard prescriptive rules of grammar will be examined to determine their origins and to assess their current significance for acceptable formal expression in prose. Although this course will not be appropriate for students who need instruction in basic grammar, it will help those who wish to become better writers as they become more informed about the etiquette of writing.

Students will learn to analyze sentence formats, identify syntactical functions of words in sentences, and be better prepared to make knowledgeable choices about sentence style

This course introduces students to various approaches to grammar: standard prescriptive grammar derived from Latin and still found in Standard Written English handbooks, descriptive grammar developed by linguists, and some transformational (generative) grammar. Students will learn to analyze sentence formats, identify syntactical functions of words in sentences, and make knowledgeable choices about sentence construction. Students will also learn how knowledge of grammar creates stylistic choices and also assists in understanding meaning. English 226 promotes the analysis of social and political uses of language.
