RATIONALE FOR CHANGE

This course currently exists as variable (1-3) credits. We are requesting that the course be set to 3 credits. A review of our special topics courses over the past seven years reveals that our special topics courses are consistently developed as three credit courses. Having the variable option tends to confuse students who at times select the course for 1 credit, which must then be administratively corrected. This change also would make the course credit consistent with the HAPP major elective requirements, as well as the majority of the program's courses and our Department's other special topics courses.
