We find it necessary to have two such courses available at both the 300 and 400 level in order to accommodate course innovation. (For example, in Spring 2016 we are offering all of PHIL 399, PHIL 399b, PHIL 498 and PHIL 499. None of these topic courses

can be accommodated in our other existing catalog courses.) We are making the language for prerequisites for all or our 300 level courses uniform.
