All courses submitted by a student in fulfillment of the requirements for the Certificate in Spanish Studies must be completed with a grade of B or higher. The certificate cannot be combined with an MLLI-Spanish major or minor.

Rationale (see instructions):

The addition of SPAN 304 (3 credits from SPAN 301 or 304) simply reflects that 301 (2nd language learners) and 304 (heritage Spanish speakers) are equivalent courses. With the current requirements students could come in with HS, AP or IB Spanish credits and complete the certificate with two courses in English. Requiring at least two Spanish courses at the 300 level and that at least three courses of the five courses be taken at UMBC makes the certificate more rigorous and gives students a better base in the language.
