**CURRENT CATALOG DESCRIPTION:**

An introduction to the philosophical problems underlying political issues and the attempts through the centuries to solve these problems. Although covering many centuries of philosophy, we need not do so in chronological order. This course will introduce students to political philosophy and will, and at the same time, attempt to locate the role of philosophical reasoning within political science.

An introduction to the theoretical issues and debates underlying political practice and policy. By examining the works of various political theorists, past and present, Western and non-Western, male and female, students gain insight into key political concepts such as liberty, equality, justice, sovereignty, rights and responsibilities, and citizenship. Emphasis is placed on applying political theories to current political debates.

**RATIONALE FOR CHANGE:** The Philosophy department has also offered courses in political philosophy for many years. Although political philosophy is a recognized subfield in both philosophy and political science, there are important methodological differences between the academic disciplines, which will be clarified by the proposed changes. Also alleviates student confusion about course offerings and requirements. In accordance with the university's commitment to diversity, theorists from underrepresented groups will now be incorporated as well.
