**CURRENT CATALOG DESCRIPTION:**

This course consists of close textual analysis of a small number of works of political philosophy written since 1600. Among the authors who may be chosen in any given year will be Hobbes, Locke, Montesquieu, Rousseau, Marx and Nietzsche. Recommended Preparation: Sophomore standing or POLI 210.

Examines the various theories of justice underlying political practice, policy, and law through the works of political theorists, past and present, Western and non-Western, male and female. Emphasis is placed on applying political theories of justice to current political debates.

**RATIONALE FOR CHANGE:** The Political Science department is currently revising its curriculum to include new minors such as Law and Justice, Policy & Politics in Practice, and International Politics. To complement these new minors, the political theory course descriptions are also being revised to reflect a more thematic approach (such as democracy) rather than a chronological one. In accordance with the university's commitment to diversity, theorists from underrepresented groups will now be incorporated into these course descriptions as well.
