RATIONALE FOR CHANGE:

In preparation for the updated curriculum, we discovered a unique gap in student learning opportunities. Currently, the department has no curricular opportunity for first to second semester freshmen eager for hands-on training. Currently, the only course options for freshmen interested in production assignments is at the upper division, creating a disparity of credit distribution. This course will correct that disparity by granting underclassmen appropriate credit at the lower division for these assignments.
