## **CURRENT CATALOG DESCRIPTION:**

This class allows the opportunity to investigate a given topic in political philosophy outside of a historical period and beyond the scope of one author. Possible topics include: philosophical responses to slavery, natural law, feminist theory and democratic theory. This course is repeatable for credit.

Examines a particular topic, problem, or issue from the perspective of political theory. Recent examples include Founding Feminisms and Nineteenth Century Feminisms. Emphasis is placed on applying political theories to current political debates. This course is repeatable for credit.

RATIONALE FOR CHANGE: The Philosophy department has also offered courses in political philosophy for many years. Although political philosophy is a recognized subfield in both philosophy and political science, there are important methodological differences between the academic disciplines, which will be clarified by the proposed changes. Also alleviates student confusion about course offerings and requirements. Eliminates outdated possible topics. Streamlines language and emphasizes application to case studies.
