This course offers an analytic study of Western music history and literature from Medieval, Renaissance, and Baroque periods, with an emphasis on styles, genres, and significant composers.

RATIONALE FOR CHANGE:

This course provides detailed cultural context for the music of Medieval, Renaissance, and 17th-Cenutry Europe. Students delve into social, religious, and political ideas during these eras that are foreign to their modern US-American experiences but that are necessary for understanding and appreciating the musical repertories that came out of these centuries. Although Music majors generally have some prior experience with 18th-21st century Western musical style, the music we cover in Music History I is vastly different not only in sound and visual notation, but also in socio-cultural significance, affording the students an opportunity to make inter-cultural connections between the music we study in this course and the music they study with their private instructors.

Adding a Culture designation option to this course would assist transfer students in their time to degree, as they tend to come to UMBC with fewer Culture credits and this is a required course within the Music major. It would also give our four-year majors more flexibility within the department for fulfilling their GEP credits.
