### PROPOSED CATALOG DESCRIPTION (Approximately 75 words in length. Please use full sentences.):

This course explores the origins, rise, and fall of the Third Reich. The course also examines the afterlife of Nazism in politics and popular culture, investigating how memory of Nazi Germany is preserved and deployed. Topics include the Nazi seizure of power in 1933, daily life in the Nazi “people’s community”, propaganda and cultural policy, discrimination, war and genocide, and National Socialism in historical memory and popular culture.

### RATIONALE FOR NEW COURSE:

I am a new assistant professor in Modern European History and am creating new courses in my areas of expertise. I am creating this course in response to expressed student interest. Additionally, this is a topic that is offered as a standalone course at numerous peer institutions, where it sees consistently robust enrollment and student engagement. The department currently does not have a course on German history below the 400 level that is available to majors and non-majors alike. The course will serve History majors and minors as well as non-majors seeking an upper-level elective on a topic with contemporary relevance. The course is likely to be taught at least biannually and can be taken as part of a sequence of courses on European history at all levels.
