We searched in 2021-2022 and successfully hired Dr. Shin Yon Kim, who teaches full-time for us.

Together, we have developed a comprehensive understanding of places where our programs intersect and where collaboration is possible, and we have begun work on collective advertising. We completely remade the program website in 2021, pulling down outdated information and reorganizing it to make sure the most important information is readily available to students and affiliate faculty.

This decision is based on two concerns: first, t pandemic made clear some of the challenges and even dang inherent in study abroad, and we have many students who a concerned about international travel in the current context. Second, travel to Asia is very expensive, and cost-prohibitive many of our students. There is no inexpensive alternative to transpacific flight that could stand in for this experience.

Create a capstone course at the 300 or 400 level to help consolidate student knowledge and provide better means of assessing the success of the program	X			The coordinating committee has discussed the capstone issue several times, and it continues to deliberate on the best path forward to revamp the major requirements. The goal is to provide a more complete experience through the capstone without straining limited teaching resources or removing any of the flexibility in the major requirements that have helped so many students adopt Asian Studies alongside another major or minor. With the advent of the Global Asias Initiative, the overall changes to the curriculum might well wait for the outcome of that project, but we do plan to submit plans for a capstone course this Spring that would, at least at first, be an optional elective to test it out before making it a requirement.

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2. Increase the number of Asian Studies majors, minors and certificate students, especially focusing on double majors and minors from other colleges at UMBC			The number of majors has dropped since the pandemic. We have dropped in a proportion also experienced by the Global Studies program. The breakdown of international travel opportunities and the decreasing desirability of living abroad post-graduation have hurt both programs. We expect our new Global Asias Initiative along with new faculty hires to help us revitalize the program, but more distance between now and the peak of the pandemic is also vital to helping us recruit.
2a Create academic pathways documents to show how students in a variety of compatible majors can add Asian Studies to their current program	х	х	In the meantime, we have been building academic pathways documents, and we remade ASIA 100 into a GEP course, which means it now attracts many students from the STEM fields. We use the course to recruit and help students understand how they might be able to complete the full minor through all courses that also count for GEP credit.

Revise and create new articulation agreements with area community colleges to increase the number of transfer students in the Asian Studies Program			Our articulation agreements with Anne Arundel Community College, Howard Community College, and Community College of Baltimore County are out of date, however there is currently a queue for work with the legal office to rework them. We hope to be able to update them in the next two years.
